Quick overview of NH's program


- Overall goal: create a Roadmap to 90% compliance with the IECC 2009 by 2017
- \$600K of ARRA-State Energy Program funds
- To date: 26 day-long free Workshops with food, CEUs
 - 1,069 building professionals trained
 - Residential and Commercial
 - Workshops expanding to also address harder-toreach audiences (realtors/appraisers, etc)
- Survey of code officials
- Public policy recommendations

NH's energy code adoption status


- IECC 2009 adopted by NH Building Code Review Board in May 2009
- Expedited because of ARRA
- Effective April 1, 2010
- Still needs to be ratified by the NH legislature
- Two-year window is closing
 - Both attempts tabled/retained, for different reasons
 - High likelihood of 2009 family of codes will sunset to 2006 codes
- There is an important lesson here!

NH's Code Officials



- Cities and towns with full-time or part-time code officials and the towns with code officials who completed the survey instrument
- NH Fire Marshal's Office and NH Public Utilities Commission provide support when asked
- Population: 1.3M, 234 towns
- State Motto: Live Free or Die

Paradigm Shifts

- <u>Significant compliance</u> (90%) with codes means we need to do more than require them
- Outreach beyond "the choir" to create demand
- General public must demand stronger codes from building-professionals and policy makers
- Energy code benefits must be valued by realtors, appraisers, financial institutions, insurers, and media
